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Month-long Exhibit Features Local Artists Pays Homage to Ward 7's Indigenous Land and Climate Crisis

April 1-30, 2022 Honfleur Gallery and Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens

WASHINGTON – The Down to Earth, exhibit shines a light on the Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens and Ward 7's past, present, and future with a sharp focus on the climate crisis and its intersectionality with systemic racism. This exhibit is the culmination of work over the past year with four different artists and includes clothing, maps, oral history, and oil paintings.

- Winter artist, <u>Rik Freeman</u> From an abundant sunrise breakfast scene on the river, looks of anguish, fear, and determined struggle to the community self-sustaining itself with looming development. Rik Freeman created three large-scale oil paintings depicting how animals and plant life have used and cared for the land in Ward 7 ranging from 12000 BC to the current day.
- Spring 2021 artist <u>Nikki Hendricks</u> created three fabric designs: African American Rights, Native American Rights and Climate Change for her 12-piece sustainable fashion collection based off of the plant and wildlife of the Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens.
- Summer artist in residence <u>Siobhan Rigg</u> produced a series of drawings and maps of the tidal Anacostia River (from Bladensburg, MD to its confluence with the Potomac) as a multimedia investigative project to document and represent the networks of political influence, financial speculation, language, and activism flowing through the ecologies and communities along the tidal Anacostia River in coming times of climate change and rising water.
- Thomas Stanley, Malik Thomas, and Mark Cooley Fall Season Artist Collective project a GPS-aided audio tour that seeks to enhance visitors' experience of Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens with insights into the social and environmental history of the neighborhoods that surround them can be heard on smartphones while Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens.

"Down to Earth is an effort to focus on humans' impact on our land and water, and humans' ability - and inability - to change the course of where we are headed. We're leaning on storytelling and art creation to change the trajectory of the climate conversation," said Julianne Brienza, founding director of Capital Fringe.



"This is a pandemic project bringing together art and nature to examine interdisplicanry issues affecting us all. We are especially excited to bring all the artists together for a culmination of this project, in person throughout April," said Tina O'Connell, exective director of the Friends of Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens.

During the exhibit, along with experiencing the artwork created over the past year, there will be conversations with the artists and a Earth Day Clean up (see schedule below).
